From the minister...

At the moment the whole nation is very much playing a waiting game, as we move step by step through the significant dates on the Government's "Road Map". (though arguably it's more of a "Timetable")

When you are waiting for something to happen, the closer you get to the moment when it finally arrives, the more frustrated and impatient you feel yourself becoming. I remember when I was in the Merchant Navy, homeward bound from some long voyage to South America. As we crossed the Atlantic the sense of anticipation would start to grow, and the excitement would really start when we made our first UK landfall (which was usually a sight of the lighthouse on Lizard Point in Cornwall). Grown men would grow as giddy as schoolboys at the prospect of soon being able to go home on leave; and we even had a name for this sense of euphoria – "the Channels" (because we had entered the English Channel).

It feels a bit like that now. The Spring is returning, the vaccination programme is continuing apace, and we can see an end to this terrible business. But the sense of "nearly being there" is so frustrating: we feel like giving up on waiting, we just want it now. And this is a temptation we have to resist; more than ever right now we need the spiritual fruit of Patience, for the sake of ourselves and others.

It's easy when you're on a ship going up the English Channel – your only option is to remain on board and wait for it to reach the docks. Giving up on lockdown now is as foolhardy as jumping over the side and trying to swim for it, believing you'll somehow get home quicker. Chances are you'll drown instead. Let's follow Paul's advice to Timothy in 2 Timothy 4:5:

"But you, keep your head in all situations, endure hardship..." And from Philippians 3:14:

"I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus."

If you've been joining me on Facebook for my weekly chapter-by-chapter Bible Study sessions on the Gospel of Mark, you will have noticed that in this week's session (chapter 9) Jesus reaches the point in his ministry where he stops touring the Northern area of the country around the Sea of Galilee, and deliberately turns south to face his destiny, the cross. Luke puts it best by saying "he set his face to go to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51, NRSV).

Jesus knew what awaited him in the capital – it would bring freedom for all of humanity, but pain and suffering for him. If our Lord can take such a journey, so can we: but ours is a journey out of pain and suffering, and into freedom. Let us undertake it with all the patience and acceptance that Jesus shows us by his own example.

My dad, himself an engineer in the Merchant Navy, used to have a saying which he quoted from when the order came down to the engine room to put the engines "full ahead". Everyone knew that this meant they were going "deep sea" – homeward bound. He used to say "Every turn of the screw brings you nearer to home".

Or in our case I guess you could say, "Every jab in the arm brings us nearer to freedom". Either way, however slow, we are getting there.

In your prayers



An early advocate of wellbeing practices, he lived to the age of 87.



Methodist Church stands in solidarity with Myanmar

The Methodist Church in Britain is standing in solidarity with its partners in Myanmar following the coup that occurred in the country at the start of February. Since the coup, there have been violent scenes in the country, with protesters being fired upon and a growing number of deaths.

The Myanmar Council of Churches has called for churches around the world to pray for justice and peace in Myanmar, and requests the release of those detained by the military regime, action on the control of Covid-19 and an end to the use of force and discrimination.

The Revd Conrad Hicks, Director of Global Relationships at the Methodist Church in Britain, commented, "We stand in wholehearted solidarity and prayer with our partner, the Myanmar Council of Churches, and wish to reiterate their call for an end to the violence and discord within the country."

A prayer in response to the call for support:

Lord Jesus we stand together with the people of Myanmar at this time of turmoil and unrest.

We hold before you our sisters and brothers in the Methodist Church of Upper Myanmar.

We pray for peace and justice for all citizens and for an end to division and conflict.

We pray for your church in Myanmar and pray for your people as they shine the light of Jesus which the darkness cannot overcome, showing your love and compassion for all people.

In solidarity with our partner, the Myanmar Council of Churches, we renounce the forces of destruction and despair and pray for your peace, hope, joy and unity to prevail. Amen.

Taketime Together


