A message from Deacon Jenny Dear Friends,

As I begin to prepare our Advent course for this year and begin to think about Christmas services and nativity plays, I started to read Isaiah 11.

"A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse... I am about to create new heavens and a new earth... I will rejoice and delight in my people... they shall not labour in vain..., everyone who thirsts, come and you that have no money come, my steadfast love shall not depart from you..." Isaiah 11

This Advent may be a little more 'normal' than last year. As I read the words of the prophet Isaiah, I was reminded of how God is a loving, creative presence in the world. Last year perhaps more than any other I needed to be reminded that we need to look at things through the eyes of faith and to seek out God who is at work within our hurting world.

Even when the world seems dark and in despair, when things seem lifeless or hopeless the Scriptures declare God remains, a creative and loving presence. The season of Advent calls us to look for God and also to look to ourselves. How can we do God's will in this world and within our communities? How can we nurture with hopefulness any shoots of new life that are emerging from all that we have been through during the pandemic? Christmas is a time where we remember that Christ was born; God came down to earth as a human baby, to live among us. Jesus the light of the world entered a world of darkness.

Do we sometimes feel that we live in a world where darkness is prevalent? During Advent we remember how light shines in the darkness....and defeats it.

Because of this there is no doubt for me that Advent is a season of hope, as much for us today as for the people of Israel waiting, yearning, and even demanding salvation from God. Today, in the midst of economic news that is hardly encouraging; in the midst of continuing wars in far-off lands; in the midst of the devastation of natural disasters, in the midst of injustice and abuse, in the midst of a global pandemic, a star still shines in the darkness. It shone then, and it continues to shine today. And this year we can celebrate Christmas as boldly and as confidently as ever, assured that this festival is good not just for us but for our world too.

Sermons and scissors

Rev Darren Middleton explains why he is training to be a hairdresser In July this year, whilst on Sabbatical, I decided to train in hairdressing and barbering at GHQ Training Academy, Plymouth. It struck me that, as we emerged from lockdown, next to seeing family and friends, hair was high on the agenda - people wanted hair salvation!

As a Presbyter in the Methodist Church I am challenged by our missional drive to be new people in new places. If we are to make a difference within our communities and be the presence of God's love in Jesus, then we need to get out from behind our church walls.

There is no surprise to my four congregations that I am engaging a new challenge, having also been a West End dancer. Hairdressing is the perfect tool to engage the wider community. The salon is a place where people come from all backgrounds and places to have some personal time that is solely for themselves. A space is given to each client to be themselves and talk, or not! Part of the service that a hairdresser gives is to listen. The salon experience is a holistic one - pampering for the hair, nurturing for the soul.

I didn't realise just how compatible sermons and scissors are but in fact, in reality, they are synonymous. Especially if one considers a sermon something that is lived in the community and not just spoken from a pulpit.

My hope is to give this experience to people who need it but can't afford it; those who cannot go to a salon for whatever reason - the homeless and

the outsider, the refugee, those suffering with mental illness and those who need to be loved and given space to just be. In commercial salons this service is not possible due to the need to make a profit. My vision is to have a salon that is not profit driven but people focused; having the ability and resources to give people the experience to grow in confidence, well-being and joy. God is calling me to provide a different kind of service - one that engages hair and heart
